19th National Reunion - San Diego, California September 9th - 14th 2018

Before the reunion officially opened many folks could be found sipping adult beverages around the pool while exchanging long overdo greetings of.... "wow you look great...haven't change a bit."

Next a smaller flag was planted for each of the 32 brothers that have died since that reunion in San Antonio. Peggy Riordan and Patti Myers lead the way, honoring their husbands John Riordan and Ralph Myers, followed by those in attendance planting a flag for the remaining 30.

Monday September 10th:



After a tasty breakfast, it was off on a tour of the city of San Diego via trolley. The two hour tour took us all around the city including the harbor where the Midway Museum is located, as well as, the old windjammer, the Star of India ca. 1863. Other areas explored during the tour were the Gaslight area, Little Italy, and of course Coronado Island. The most entertaining mile or so was riding over the Coronado Bridge and watching several of the "acrophobic folks" suddenly looking for something on the floor of the trolley. While on the

island we passed by the Hotel del Coronado, which is where most of the movie "Some like it Hot" was filmed.





Tuesday September 11th:

All gathered around 9:30A.M. for the short bus ride to Balboa Park. This city park was created for the Panama - California Exposition of 1915, spans over 1200 acres, and includes 10 or 12 museums, several gardens, a Botanical Building (arboretum), as well as the famous San Diego Zoo.





The plan called for 2½ hours of free time for exploring whatever venue you'd like. Some visited the Air and Space Museum (a good one), the Automobile Museum (OK), and/or the Botanical Building (free). Basically you were free to walk, or ride a tram, or scooter (yep they're here too) to anywhere in the park. At 12:30P.M., we all met up for lunch at the Prado Restaurant before being bused back to the hotel.


